Dear Parents and Carers,

It has been another exciting month at Furzefield with some incredible learning and experiences going on. As always, I must thank the amazing staff who put everything into ensuring that your children are happy, safe and getting the very best educational experience with us every single day.

We are passionate about providing rich experiences and a broad curriculum to your children. It is what we are all about at Furzefield. This month alone we've seen some amazing owls, had a virtual reality workshop, had some great success at our football tournaments and netball games, visited Henley Fort, Gatton Park and Christmas Journey, watched movies at Oxted Cinema and did video calls to Canada! It's been busy! It is these amazing opportunities that help us to provide a **well-rounded education** to all our pupils. Maths, English and Science are the core of our curriculum, but it's important to balance those subjects with a range of other valuable educational experiences.

Whilst we do everything we can to ensure that we are providing your children with these rich opportunities, we can't provide them to children who are not in school. Of course, if your child is unwell we would not expect them to be in school, but research in this area shows that even just a few days of absence can have a significant negative effect on your child's achievement. That same research also shows that over time, poor attendance in primary school can create gaps in your child's education that could negatively impact their success at secondary school. A day's learning that has been missed can never be fully regained, and even just one day missed often means that children will find it much harder to access the next day's learning.

We consider anything above 96% attendance over the year to be good attendance, but even dropping a small amount below this percentage has a real impact. 94% attendance over the year means that your child will have missed 11 days of school. That's about 22 hours of maths and English lessons that they will have missed. When we break down the numbers, it becomes much easier to understand how quickly children can fall behind the rest of the class and much makes it much clearer why attendance is so important. I would be grateful if families did not to book holidays during term time. Our policy is that these will always be unauthorised. It may be a bit cheaper but it can potentially damage your child's longer-term educational success, both in primary and secondary school. There are 365 days in the year and 190 of those are in school. That leaves 175 days for holidays and all the other fun things that we do as parents!

On the theme of attendance, please could I also remind parents that the expectation is that pupils are in their seats for the register to be taken at 8:50am each day. School gates close at 8:50am and I would be grateful for your cooperation in ensuring that children are in school on time.

Thank you to all parents and carers for your continued support to the school. When we work together we can provide the very best education for your children.


















Everyone enjoyed the

Year 2 - Christmas Journey

Year 2 at Forest School



In early November, Year 2 had their first Forest School experiences of the year. At our first session, Miss Roberts told us that she had found something very intriguing in the hedgerow so we went to have a look.

We had to be very stealthy so as not to disturb whatever was there! We discovered small bird and animal bones littered around, and a huge nest containing 3 blue, frosty eggs. We discussed what we thought might have eaten the animals and left the eggs. Many of us were convinced it was a Frost Dragon!

Later on, after some tree climbing and exploring, we used a blue sweetened dough to make dragon tails. We wrapped the dough around a stripped stick and cooked it over the fire.

We started our second session very excited because earlier that day, Miss Roberts had sent us a photo of some baby dragons that seemed to have hatched from the blue, frosty eggs in the hedgerow.

Unfortunately, by the time we got there, the dragons had disappeared. Some say we might have scared them away!

Miss Roberts then showed us how to make miniature dragons out of clay and other natural materials such as feathers, seeds, corn kernels and wood chips. We then had a go at making our own. Some of us also made stained-glass style dragon eggs.

We were also able to have lots of free play and den building, and finished the day with a lovely cup of hot chocolate by the fire, delicious!

John knew so many fun facts and he loved that we knew lots about Rainforests.


It was shocking to see the chopped down trees where they had been chopped down for palm oil!

It was amazing travelling on a real helicopter through the VR goggles!


At the end, John asked where we wanted to go and he showed us under the ocean too!



This training covers the following learning topics:

- Road signs and pedestrian crossings
- Recognising safer and unsafe places to cross
- How to cross between parked cars
- The benefits of active travel

Attendance and Punctuality

Thank you for all your support in helping us to improve the overall attendance at Furzefield Primary School.



As we all know, attendance is so important for your child to achieve their full potential at school.

It is important that you inform us as soon as possible if your child is absent from school for any reason. You can do this by phone, note to the teacher/ office or by email (enquiries@furzefield.surrey.sch.uk).



If you need to book a medical appointment for your child, please try to make it out of school hours. Please make as much effort to enable them to spend some of the day in school.


We monitor children's attendance and lateness on a regular basis, with the Educational Welfare Officer (EWO) and we cannot authorise absences during term time for reasons such as holidays (please see our Attendance Policy for further details).

Penalty Notices

A Penalty Notice may be issued as an alternative to the prosecution of each parent/carer for their child's unauthorised absence from school and requires the recipient to pay a fixed amount.

The amount payable on issue of a Penalty Notice is £60 per parent per child if paid within 21 days of receipt of the notice, rising to £120 if paid within 28 days. If the Penalty Notice is not paid within 28 days, the Local Authority must prosecute the parent/carer for failing to ensure regular school attendance under Section 444 Education Act 1996. Please note that penalty notices are issued per parent/carer per child so a family of two parents and two children will receive 4 penalty notices.

Prosecution





It is also very important that children have a good routine of settling into school every morning, so do try to ensure they arrive at school on time.

Please remember that the school opens at **8.40am** to allow for the children to settle in. Registration begins at 8.50am when the children should be in their classrooms and ready for learning. A late mark is recorded on the register after this time.

Therefore, please aim to be at school at 8.40 and not 8.50am so that the children are not missed off the class register. If they are late, they **must** come and report to the office.

The office opening times are 8am to 4pm. Our email address is **enquiries @furzefield.surrey.sch.uk** however this is monitored term time only during the hours of 8.30am to 4pm
